Sumac-ade July 9, 2021

What is a plant that flowers and gives us a refreshing source of lemonade-like drink, grows all over New England...and we think is a pest plant? Yup...Sumac. Before you get all excited about potentially confusing it with Poison Sumac, let me just say that it would be mighty hard to confuse the two flowers. Our sumac, Staghorn Sumac has a flower, a drupe, that is dark maroon and stands upright. Poison Sumac has a white drupe, which sometimes is up and sometimes is down. See picture.



There...easy to spot the difference. Now comes my disclaimer. If you are not 110% sure of what you are gathering, then don't gather. I am not a certified herbalist or botanist, nor am I attempting to provide medical advice. But you can learn a lot about sumac varieties by going to the Michigan State University extension site: <a href="https://www.canr.msu.edu/news/making\_sumac\_tea">https://www.canr.msu.edu/news/making\_sumac\_tea</a>. Sadly, I could find no mention of sumac on Vermont's Extension site. Oh, and keep in mind as you search for this plant: don't trespass....always ask before stepping on someone else's property.

Also, it's a good idea *not* to gather sumac immediately after a rainstorm—as rain likely has washed away a lot of the taste and nutrients—nor from the side of a paved road, due to potential pollutants.

The delightful and vitamin-C-packed sumac drink is easy to make. Collect your drupes, give them a light shake, wrap them in cheesecloth and drop into a container of water. It's recommended not to use hot water, as that destroys the vitamin C. Wait 24 hours, remove the bundle, and squeeze the drupe while it's still in the cheesecloth (to get all of the goodness out into your container while retaining the fruit and other things...), compost the drupe, then add your favorite sweetener to taste: voilà! You've made a light berry-lemon flavored drink. Sumac infusion is a delicately thirst-quenching summertime beverage that is also good for you...how often can you say that?

Would be a good base for your own version of Switchel. Can't you see it now? At a local town event, we could have a Sumac drink contest to determine the best concoction. Sounds like a fun time.




Sumac grows everywhere! Most folks think of it as a weed, but you shouldn't. There is a gentleman named Toby Fulwiler of Fairfield, VT, who makes lovely small bowls of Sumac wood (pictured at left). And there are a number of websites with useful suggestions on how to use dry sumac branches for things such as collecting maple sap! So get hunting...both on the 'net and outside! S'good for ya! Cheers!

#### COVID-19 VACCINATION CLINIC AND FREE ICE CREAM SOCIAL

On Friday July 23, Rescue Inc. came to West Halifax for four hours with their mobile vaccination clinic. More than a dozen persons received their first dose of Pfizer (good for ages 12 and up) or the single-dose Johnson & Johnson/Janssen (for ages 18 and up). The Halifax Community Club provided free ice cream for the attendees.





**EVENT**: On August 13th, Rescue Inc. and the Halifax Community Club will come together again at the Hall for a 2<sup>nd</sup> clinic.

Where: Halifax Community Hall, 20 Brook Road, West Halifax When: Friday, 13 August from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. Rain or shine.

<u>Who can get vaccinated</u>: Anyone who qualifies, regardless of where you live. People at least 12 years old can receive the Pfizer vaccine which requires 2 doses given 3 weeks apart. People who are at least 18 years old can receive the 1-dose Johnson & Johnson/Janssen vaccine.

<u>Why</u>: For your health and life and for the health and lives of your family and your community. The vaccines, which are safe and effective, greatly reduce the risk of sickness and death due to COVID-19.

\*\* The vaccinations AND the ice cream will be free to all. In addition, **Kelso the Therapy Dog** (pictured working at the library) will be there for anyone who wants the comfort of a loving dog while getting vaccinated. \*\*

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT CALLS

On July 4 four men responded to a medical call for a person who had passed out. Deerfield Valley Rescue responded but did not transport.

On July 16 eighteen men responded to a motor vehicle accident on Reed Hill Road. One fire truck responded to the site of the crash, and one responded to the Halifax school to set up a landing zone for a LifeFlight helicopter. Both occupants of the car were ejected from the vehicle. The 18-year-old driver from Halifax did not survive. The passenger had multiple broken bones and was flown to Dartmouth-Hitchcock. A very sad day.

On July 25, three men responded to a bicycle accident on Hanson Road. It was the day of a bike race that usually comes through Halifax each year. A woman was treated for 'road rash' on knees and elbow. Wounds were cleaned and bandaged. The person was taken to Guilford by Halifax Constable Andy Rice.

Town History....Contributed by Edie Fenton in a 1985 newsletter....Halifax received its charter from New Hampshire on May 11, 1750. Hubbard Eastman wrote in The Vermont Historical Gazetteer published in 1891: "before any division of the said land be made to and among the grantees, a tract of land as near the centre of the said township as the land will admit of, shall be reserved and marked out for town lots, one of which shall be allotted to each grantee of the Contents of one acre.' This reserved land at the geographical centre of the town, was designed to serve the purposes of a garrison in case there should be wa[r] with the Indians. Here each grantee might erect his block-house to which he might retire with his family on short notice, in case of danger while the country was new, having an acre of ground which he could cultivate as a garden. But the Indians gave no trouble to the early settlers of Halifax and the land reserved for purposes of defence has long since been otherwise disposed of." The taxes as provided by the charter were: "One ear of Indian corn...on the 25th of December (Christmas), if lawfully demanded" as a tax for the 10 years between 1750 and 1760. In 1761 the

taxes were raised to one shilling per 100 acres. -- <u>http://sites.rootsweb.com/~vtwindha/vhg5/vt\_gazetteer-halifax.htm</u>


