
DVFIBER ARRIVES IN HALIFAX

Halifax is finally getting real high-speed internet. In the coming months, we will see bucket trucks and crews working on utility poles to construct the DVFiber network to every on-grid location in town. This is a state-of-the-art fiber optic network, as good as any available anywhere in the country. Connections to Halifax customers will begin this year and continue into 2024.

Having real high-speed internet means you can go to school, see a doctor, attend a meeting or event, shop, work remotely, and visit your friends and family online from your home. The network won't slow down, and there is no limit on how much data you can consume. Best of all, we own it. DVFiber is a Communications Union District (CUD) that owns the network and sets the prices. The district is governed by representatives appointed by the Selectboards of 24 member towns including Halifax. There are nine other CUDs covering most areas of the state. Construction is financed primarily through grants of federal funds administrated by the Vermont Community Broadband Board.

Pricing is simple with no hidden fees. The price for Internet ranges from \$75/month to \$130/month, depending on the speed of connection you choose. There is an optional Wi-Fi Extender (about



Halifax's Broadband Committee and similar committees in other towns worked for many years to get broadband delivered here but with limited success. In combination, these efforts showed that the poor quality of service was a statewide problem requiring a new solution. State legislation in 2015 established the legal structure for CUDs and additional legislation co-sponsored by Representative Laura Sibilia in 2019 and 2021 provided funding, technical assistance, and state oversight of federal grant funds.

nonprofit Halifax Community Club which manages the building (https://czresearch.com/halifax/).

Coffee and teas are always available with a changing selection of edibles. While Andrea bakes regularly (Laurel, not so much!), guest bakers contribute their bars, brownies, scones, biscuits, fruit, nuts, cookies, and muffins. We've had macaroons, brownies, blondies, sticky toffee bars, chocolate chip cookies, cheese & pepper biscuits, cheese & crackers, banana bread, mini-cheesecakes, Congo bars, and Cranberry-Chocolate Chip Oatmeal Cookies from Barb Waldron as published in the Halifax Cookbook. Got a favorite? Let us know!

In addition, Donna & Pete Silverberg contribute a variety of packaged snacks. The Silverbergs have also donated a new Bunn coffee brewing station, a dozen comfy seat cushions, box fans, and essential supplies, among other things. Lynda Copeland (Laurel's mom) donated comfy seat cushions, tablecloths, a card table, and a microwave oven. The Café has been open on Thursday and Saturday since June 1. The plan is to adapt times / days to people's preferences and activities, so if you have a suggestion, let me know.



OTIS HISTORY WEEKEND – Friday & Saturday, Sept. 8 & 9, 2023

On September 8 and 9, the Otis family will host a series of events celebrating a famous son of Halifax and colonial Vermont. All events take place at or depart from the Halifax Community Hall, 20 Brook Road, West Halifax, VT.

Friday, Sept. 8 – 9:30 AM (Tentative schedule) Gather at the Community Hall in West Halifax to carpool up to **Whitneyville Cemetery** where fine hand-carved headstones will be revealed during the Otis Family Commemorative Headstones Dedication (10:00-11:30 AM, Whitneyville Cemetery, 1470 Old County Rd). Revolutionary War Patriot Stephen Otis & Mayflower Descendant Lucy Chandler Otis lived the last 20 + years of their lives in Halifax at the home of their son and daughter-in-law, Stephen Otis, Jr. and Phoebe Glynn Otis. They helped raise Elisha Graves Otis at the Otis homestead on the section of Perry Road that is now a trail. Elisha Otis' introduction of the safety elevator in 1857 enabled us to move safely to & from great heights and ushered in the era of skyscrapers. The ceremony will include a color guard, blessing by local pastor Doug LaPlante, and dedication by DAR members from Brattleboro. This celebration is hosted by their direct descendants, Carol Otis and Kelly Hazen Otis.

Saturday, Sept. 9 – 9:30 AM (Tentative schedule) Gather at the Community Hall in West Halifax to carpool up to the south end of Perry Road for the **Otis Homestead Hike** to the birthplace of Elisha Graves Otis and subsequent visit to the old Otis Mill on lower Perry Road, time permitting.

Then at 1:00 PM at the Community Hall, David Gillespie of South Carolina will demonstrate the traditional, 18th Century method of carving headstones (photo: D Gillespie) while Native American Crafters demonstrate flint knapping (photo: Wikipedia), bead artisanry, and porcupine quill artisanry. Final events and schedule TBD.


JOAN'S SIGHTINGS.


Some exciting sightings at the Coursers'. We had a bear visit. Wayne saw him first and told me. The first thing I thought of was smashed feeders so went running out with a broom. I rounded the corner, and the bear and I

were face to face. That was when I figured just maybe I acted too fast! I stood there and shook the broom, and the bear ran away! But the more I thought about it, the more I thought just maybe I should have given a bit more thought in the first place.....guess I was lucky it was kind of a small young bear. I will not act so quickly next time! We saw it again when we were eating supper, walking alongside the fire station, then it crossed the road and disappeared. Have not seen it since. Perhaps it thought....I am not going back to that place with that crazy woman with a broom!!!

Have many birds. We are still enjoying the Baltimore Orioles. Last year they left on July 24th. So I am expecting them to leave soon. I sure will miss them and wish them a safe flight to their destination. I also have Blue Jays, one or two Chickadees, Mourning Doves, Evening Grosbeaks, Sparrows, Goldfinches, Purple Finches, a Rose-Breasted Grosbeak, Mr. & Mrs. Cardinal, a Brown-Headed Cowbird, a Grackle, Red-Winged Blackbirds, a Black-Throated Warbler (it had the tiny yellow spot in front of its eye like the bird book explained) for two days that was exciting to me; I think he was fueling up for the long trip to his winter home., a few Starlings, some Robins, a Catbird (that eats lots of the grape jelly put out for the Orioles). I saw a House Wren using a birdhouse on our barn (that makes me happy), two White-Breasted Nuthatches, and one Red-Breasted one. I was excited to see Tree Swallows flying and sitting on wires near the Community Hall! I have two Woodpeckers; the Downy also likes the grape jelly! There is a Yellow-bellied Sapsucker and a couple of Hummingbirds. I am sorry to see some of the summer birds leave but the fall and winter birds will be arriving soon. Wayne and I saw a good-sized flock of young wild Turkeys. We also saw a deer way out in one of Malcom's hay fields. Sure do enjoy the wildlife!!


