

CHAPELS IN THE WOODS



I was walking in the woods a year and a half ago, in January, admiring the otter tracks that suggested a slippery otter-y party (see photo). A bit later, I spied something unexpected: a chapel up on a hill in the middle of the woods!





Oddly, this was the second chapel in the woods I had come across in Halifax. In September 2022, while participating in a hike to the Otis homestead on the impassable part of Perry Road, I was surprised by the appearance of a wooden chapel in the woods. It is in the style of the medieval Norwegian Stave church, built using Viking shipbuilding skills as Scandinavians converted to Christianity. Some time later I was told it was built for a wedding.



VERMONT AUTHOR DONATES BOOK ABOUT BEAVERS



Beavers Away! is a 2016 Moonbeam Awards Winner in the Environmental Issues Category. Beavers Away! tells the true story of a game warden named Elmo Heter, who solved a complicated problem in a very novel way. He devised a method to safely reintroduce beavers into a remote wilderness—by parachuting them from the sky! The relocated beavers were able to quickly restore the eroded and barren landscape and create lush habitat that provided food and shelter for many other types of animals. This remarkable story of Elmo and a beaver named Geronimo is significant today as we confront the effects of climate change and try to protect and conserve wetlands and the wildlife that depend on them.

Author Jennifer Lovett has donated copies of her book for distribution to local schools and libraries. Linda Huebner took one to the Jacksonville Library and brought another to the Halifax School Library.

Lovett also sent a copy for Bonnyvale Environmental Education Center which has been donated to the Marlboro School/Library, as BEEC had already obtained a copy.

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UNION SOCIETY RESUMES SUNDAY EVENING SERVICES IN HALIFAX CENTER

On June 23, the Halifax Union Society resumed inter-denominational Sunday evening services in Halifax Center. The next bi-weekly services are scheduled for July 7 and 21. All services begin at 5PM. The location is 44 Stowe Mountain Road in Halifax Center, two miles south of the town office.

This is the first year of services following the retirement of long-time pastor Marcia Dorey. Guest ministers who are comfortable in the group's non-denominational heritage and informal style will lead each service. Doug LaPlante, pastor of Jacksonville Community Church and Wilmington Baptist Church led on June 23 and will lead on July 7. Jon Heydenreich, "Mindful Minute" columnist for the *Brattleboro Reformer* and part-time Lutheran pastor in Brattleboro, will lead on July 21, August 4 and 18, and September 1.

The Union Society was formed in 1891 by neighbors who wanted to worship together but lacked enough members to form a congregation of any one denomination. The group took ownership of its church building from the Baptist congregation that moved from Halifax Center to West Halifax. In 1933, the Society formalized a broadly inclusive statement of purpose: "...to uplift all to a practical, useful life, and inspire them to improve their opportunities and natural faculties for better living and better understanding of worthwhile purposes of life..." Over the decades, attendance has fluctuated but has consistently included a diverse mix of local and regional residents and seasonal visitors. A small group of trustees maintains the church property and arranges the program. The Union Society is open and welcoming to all.

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Up on Hanson Road and hereabout we are seeing geese, a grouse, and turkeys, crows and ravens, robins and blue jays, and a wealth of songbirds: indigo buntings, goldfinches, catbirds, chickadees, cardinals, tree swallows, bluebirds (pic), chipping sparrows, song sparrows, winter wrens, phoebes, yellowbellied sapsuckers, common yellowthroat (photographed in a lilac, right), tufted titmouses, and eastern wood pee-wees. Day and night we hear the red-eyed vireos and veeries. Larger denizens include deer, porcupine, raccoon, grey fox (with kits!), and bobcat (glimpsed in the gloaming). The yellow swallowtails and other butterflies dance around in the sunshine.



In West Halifax, a dead tree contrasted with the leafed-out tree against a stormy sky the other day. And down in the disc golf course below the school, an old beaver lodge can be seen beyond a dried-out beaver channel.
